# Cambridge International AS Level English General Paper (8021)

For examination from 2019





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## Introduction

The main aim of this booklet is to exemplify candidate responses for those teaching Cambridge International AS Level English General Paper 8021. There are 2 sections in Paper 2 and candidates must answer all questions. These questions consist of a range of sub-questions. These include questions which require short answers and more extended answers which require responses of up to 120 words.

The sample responses used here for illustrative purposes (prior to the first sitting of 8021 in 2019), come from a different version of the Cambridge International AS level General Paper which contains a paper that is very similar to the format of the new 8021 paper 2. This variant tests the same skills for the same number of marks using similar question construction and variation.

The mark scheme from this variant has been included in this booklet to help you understand how these highly comparable assessment criteria have been applied.

In this booklet, we have provided four answers for each of the questions with some examiner comments after each response.

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### Assessment overview

### Paper 2 – Comprehension

Written paper, 1 hour 45 minutes hours, 50 marks

Candidates answer compulsory questions on reading material. The paper has two sections and each is worth 25 marks. Candidates must answer all questions in each of the two sections on the paper.

The assessment objectives (AOs) tested in this paper are:

#### AO1 Selection and application of information

- Demonstrate understanding of information from a variety of material.
- Identify, select and interpret relevant data, information and examples.
- Apply information that exemplifies ideas and opinions.

#### AO2 Analysis and evaluation

- Demonstrate the ability to analyse the meaning of language as used in its context.
- Develop explanations with examples, analysis and evaluation.
- Develop, analyse and evaluate arguments and make supported judgements.

#### AO3 Communication using written English

- Write structured responses, using a range of appropriate language for a variety of purposes.
- Communicate information, ideas and opinions clearly and accurately.
- Construct cohesive and organised responses, linking ideas and arguments.

The sections consist of a range of sub-questions. These include questions which require short answers and more extended answers of up to 120 words.

**In section A,** candidates are required to explain and interpret the information provided in the material to show understanding. They are also required to respond by writing a persuasive text that expresses an opinion and justifies a conclusion.

**In section B,** candidates are required to demonstrate the ability to read for detailed understanding at word, sentence and paragraph level. They are required to demonstrate understanding of how language features are used in a variety of styles and registers. Candidates are assessed on how they analyse and evaluate the material to show an awareness of the strengths and weaknesses of different kinds of information presented. They are required identify and analyse inference.

All questions will be based on unseen material on an insert accompanying the question paper. The texts may originate from either print or online material, for example, reports, reviews, essays, blogs, scripts, speeches and descriptions. Other material may include, for example, diagrams, data and notes.

The unseen material will be up to 900 words in length. The number of words does not include any introductory notes or glossary notes.

The balance of assessment of reading and writing skills is equal.

## Material for Section A from the Insert

The Kumala family has decided that it's time to replace their family car.

Mr Kumala mostly works from home but has to travel to his office, 20km from home, three times each week.

Mrs Kumala is a doctor at the local hospital which is less than 1 km from the family house.

Mercutio, aged 21, is studying at university and holds a full driving licence.

Claudia is in her final year at school and hopes to study modern languages at the local university. She has recently begun a course of driving lessons.

Matilda is 10 years of age.

Members of the family have expressed interest in the following models:

The **Geronimo** is a spacious, high-performance, five-seater vehicle, with four wheel drive, capable of 'off road driving'. A new Geronimo is beyond the family's budget, but the local dealership has a pre-owned, low mileage model which comes with a one year guarantee covering all parts and labour. CO<sub>2</sub> emissions are rated at 255 g/km.

The **Cuboid** is a five-seater model which is fitted with parking sensors and a roof rack designed to carry a range of sporting/leisure equipment. The car comes with a comprehensive seven year guarantee. CO<sub>2</sub> emissions are rated at 140 g/km.

The **Ecodream** is advertised as a compact five-seater hybrid model (capable of using a battery as well as conventional fuel; combining electric and petrol technology). The car comes with a comprehensive three year guarantee. CO<sub>2</sub> emissions are rated at 44 g/km.

#### The following information should be taken into account.

- 1 Matilda is easily bored on car journeys and so she tends to irritate other members of the family.
- 2 The Cuboid isn't regarded as very cool by young people.
- 3 Insurance for high-performance vehicles is costly, especially for younger drivers and those not holding a full driving licence.
- 4 The family likes to spend weekends visiting remote lakes and forests to enjoy outdoor sports such as canoeing, windsurfing and hiking.
- 5 The Ecodream has a range of 50 km in full electric mode and can be charged at home.
- 6 Mr Kumala would much rather Mercutio use the family car rather than be a passenger with his friends.
- 7 Mercutio is very fashion conscious and cares about his image with his friends.
- 8 Mr Kumala recently caused \$300 worth of damage whilst attempting a tight manoeuvre in a supermarket car park.
- 9 Mrs Kumala is a local councillor and a member of the Environmental Party.
- 10 DVD players are a standard fitting for rear-seat passengers in the Geronimo.

- 11 No one in the family is mechanically minded.
- 12 The family is working within a tight budget.
- 13 There are often long queues at the only petrol station on the route between Mr Kumala's home and his office.

But enough of regulation, what about the laws of the highway? To me, as a cyclist, I see a car coming and I am 99% confident that it will behave in a predictable manner, because drivers are trained to stick to the rules. Surely riders could do the same? Unfortunately though, when I see another rider, I have no idea if they are going to slow down, speed up, stop, run over a pedestrian and say it was my fault, or do a wheelie down the wrong side of the road!

Last year, the Metropolitan Police launched Operation Safeway in response to the deaths of six cyclists who were killed in London in November. Officers manned major junctions and trouble spots and handed out a total of 13,818 fines - with 4,085 going to cyclists. Of course, a driver can do far more damage in a car - or worse, a lorry - than any cyclist, but that's still a lot of cyclists jumping red lights and whizzing down footpaths. Besides, the process of holding drivers to account is easy because you have a means of identifying the miscreant and catching up with them at a later date. However, an officer witnessing a dangerous cyclist can do little more than shake his fist in their direction.

I wouldn't call myself a cyclist with a capital 'c', but I know many of them and they're a sensitive bunch. So I'm writing this anonymously. Maybe it's time for me to put the bike away and start walking instead.

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## Material for Section B from the Insert

After 12 years riding a bike in London I recently came to a shocking conclusion: what scares me the most as a cyclist is not the cars, not the lorries and not even the taxi passengers who unexpectedly wrench their door open in front of you – but other cyclists.

From busy roads to quiet estate pathways, canal towpaths to back streets, they move with astonishingly little regard for anyone else, leaving old and young, pedestrians and fellow two-wheelers spinning in their self-righteous wake. They buy a bike and they buy a bell, and they make me despair because everywhere they go they set the cause of cycling back.

You might correctly point out that cyclists are overwhelmingly the victims of the road and that motor vehicles are still the main danger to life and limb for cyclists and pedestrians alike. According to CTC, the UK cycling charity, in 2012, 98% of serious or fatal pedestrian injuries in urban areas were due to collisions with motor vehicles. Between 2008 and 2012 nine pedestrians were killed by cycles, while 1,361 were killed by cars.

But none of this excuses the breathtakingly bad behaviour of a significant minority of cyclists. If you travel in a city during rush hour, the chances are that you will have seen someone on a bicycle pull a stunt that, had it been perpetrated by a car driver, would have seen them dragged from the wheel and strung from the nearest lamp-post. And you will have seen it time and time again.

This is why they are a danger to the cause of cycling and to cyclists themselves. While none of us is perfect, these people slip into a world where the rules of the road are irrelevant, and common courtesy goes out of the window. They are increasingly the ones who cut across our path unexpectedly, whether pedestrian, car or cyclist, and who push us aside or scream at us because we've slowed down to allow an older person or child to live.

In fact, I'd say car drivers in general deserve more credit than they get from the cycling fraternity, because I don't recall ever seeing a car driver spot a space on a crowded pedestrian crossing that's a couple of centimetres wider than his car, put his head down, cross to the wrong side of the road, and bolt through at full speed. Nor do you see many cars leap on to a footpath behind a tight knot of pedestrians and proceed to ring their bell furiously until everyone jumps out of their way. And I probably don't even need to start talking about red lights, do I?

But the physical hazards posed by these new racers are not the real danger to cyclists – it's the damage to the cycling image they constitute that's truly problematic.

To the harassed pedestrian for whom the ringing of a bell has become a tense precursor to either an earful of abuse or a near-death experience, the moron has become the norm. The new boy racer has become all cyclists. And that's why they are really dangerous, because cycling needs to progress and be embraced, but the more badly behaved and unaccountable some cyclists are perceived to be, the greater the risk that we'll all be forced into restrictive and bureaucratic measures.

Compulsory insurance is one of those cure-alls for accountability that is regularly put forward, which is fine in principle, but although the person who just killed your dog might be able to offer compensation, you'd still have to catch them first. Registration is another oft-proposed solution to the problem. Japan is the only country that requires bikes to be registered. Switzerland and others phased it out because of the cost and the bureaucracy. Now, the UK loves a bit of red tape, but registering every single bike? I don't think so. And apart from that, the freedom of cycling is a big draw for many of us. Take that away and it becomes another bureaucratic burden.
