Generic Marking Principles

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptors for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:

Marks awarded are always whole marks (not half marks, or other fractions).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme, referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:

Rules must be applied consistently, e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

	Do <u>not</u> refer to Limoni Books.	
	Answer in continuous prose.	
	Credit any of the following points and any other valid points.	
	In both the DM and the initial talk, Emilia referred constantly to the content of his blog/was clearly interested in what he was writing about/was genuinely thrilled to meet him and his dogs, as she was also a dog owner, so she completely understood where he was coming from/could talk about the blog to him on the same level.	
	Emilia heads up the company, so he would be dealing directly with the person who has the final say about his book.	
	As he would be a first-time author, Emilia's statement that 'every book and author matters to Tomasei Publishing/Tomasei Publishing would work tirelessly on his behalf' would be comforting.	
	Plus, when he explained to her that he was a bit overwhelmed by all the attention/ by talk of book deals, she was very solicitous, and Tomasei Publishing is a small-to medium-sized company, so they would be able to keep a close eye on him as promised.	
	It is also a relatively new company, so it is probably keen to make its mark/get as many authors on board as possible to keep growing/full of younger staff still passionate about publishing.	
	Most of the books that Tomasei Publishing publishes are works of modern fiction, so they would have lots of expertise in this genre/regarding his book.	
	As he loves Flindis, he would be pleased to be keeping everything about his book local/contributing to the wealth of Flindis by keeping it all local and he would be joining a stable of authors who were either inhabitants of Flindis or writing about Flindis, so he might feel at home/more in his comfort zone.	
	By being allowed full editorial control of his book, the book would turn out <u>exactly how</u> he envisaged it.	
	In assessing the answer award marks for a coherent appraisal, clearly expressed, of three or more relevant considerations that make use of analytical skills.

	Credit any of the following points or any other valid points.	
	It has been <u>established long</u> er (1), so it is a <u>well-known</u> company/its expertise should be second-to-none (1)	
	and it has connections to other types of companies (1) to make the book earn more money through spin-offs/TV programmes, films, live events. (1)	
	It is a <u>larger company</u> /has a <u>huge</u> international reach/ readership (1), so his book is very likely to be a bestseller worldwide (1),	
	meaning that he would probably earn <u>more royalties</u> with Limoni Books (1) as there would probably be <u>more books sold</u> in total (1),	
	and they are offering him the <u>bigger advance/\$50 000</u> (1), so he would be more likely to be able to buy a flat (adding together the advance, royalties and spin-offs). (1)

	He does not seem that fired up about his job/interested in this particular blog/it seems as if he is just going through the motions (1)	
	(as) the DM looks as if it is just a routine one/a template/could have been sent by anyone. (1)	
	At the start of the talk, he seems to be very business-focused (1)	
	(as) he makes no attempt to seem friendly towards someone he is meeting for the first time. (1)	
	He appears to lack people skills (1)	
	(as) he did not use the normal psychological tactics employed by business people to win a deal (1),	
	such as finding some common ground with your target (1)	
	(or) engaging in small talk to build rapport. (1)

	They will have to pay using their smartphones. (1)	
2(c)(iii)	With reference to lines 15 to 31, identify <u>three</u> disadvantages of formalising the paratransit sector.	3
	Credit any three of the following points.	
	A better service could mean a <u>higher</u> price for users. (1)	
	In <u>Accra</u> , a <u>15% fare increase</u> has been agreed. (1)	
	It <u>compensates</u> owners for <u>not</u> being able to operate to <u>full capacity</u> . (1)	
	This increase is being fully passed on to consumers. (1)

	and <u>expanding</u> schemes such as reserved lanes for high-occupancy vehicles. (1)	
	<u>Governments</u> should introduce <u>tax incentives</u> for <u>employers encouraging</u> carpooling (1)	
	and <u>tax incentives</u> for <u>staff who are</u> carpooling. (1)
