

1 The curve C has polar equation $r = 2e^{\theta}$, for $\frac{1}{6}\pi \le \theta \le \frac{1}{2}\pi$. Find

(i) the area of the region bounded by the half-lines
$$\theta = \frac{1}{6}\pi$$
, $\theta = \frac{1}{2}\pi$ and C , [2]

(ii) the length of
$$C$$
. [3]

2 The cubic equation $x^3 - px - q = 0$, where p and q are constants, has roots α , β , γ . Show that

(i)
$$\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2 = 2p$$
, [1]

(ii)
$$\alpha^3 + \beta^3 + \gamma^3 = 3q$$
, [2]

(iii)
$$6(\alpha^5 + \beta^5 + \gamma^5) = 5(\alpha^3 + \beta^3 + \gamma^3)(\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2).$$

3 It is given that

$$S_n = \sum_{r=1}^n u_r = 2n^2 + n.$$

Write down the values of S_1 , S_2 , S_3 , S_4 . Express u_r in terms of r, justifying your answer. [4]

Find

$$\sum_{r=n+1}^{2n} u_r. \tag{3}$$

4 It is given that

$$I_n = \int_0^1 \frac{x^n}{\sqrt{(1+2x)}} \, \mathrm{d}x.$$

Show that, for $n \ge 1$,

$$(2n+1)I_n = \sqrt{3} - nI_{n-1}.$$

Show that

$$I_3 = \frac{2}{35}(\sqrt{3} + 1). \tag{4}$$

5 It is given that
$$y = (1+x)^2 \ln(1+x)$$
. Find $\frac{d^3y}{dx^3}$. [3]

Prove by mathematical induction that, for every integer $n \ge 3$,

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}^n y}{\mathrm{d}x^n} = (-1)^{n-1} \frac{2(n-3)!}{(1+x)^{n-2}}.$$

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6 The linear transformation $T: \mathbb{R}^4 \to \mathbb{R}^4$ is represented by the matrix **M**, where

$$\mathbf{M} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & -3 & -1 & 2 \\ 4 & -10 & 0 & 2 \\ 1 & -1 & 3 & -4 \\ 5 & -12 & 1 & 1 \end{pmatrix}.$$

Find, in either order, the rank of M and a basis for the null space K of T.

Evaluate

$$\mathbf{M} \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ -2 \\ -3 \\ -4 \end{pmatrix},$$

and hence show that every solution of

$$\mathbf{Mx} = \begin{pmatrix} 2\\16\\10\\22 \end{pmatrix}$$

has the form

$$\mathbf{x} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ -2 \\ -3 \\ -4 \end{pmatrix} + \lambda \mathbf{e}_1 + \mu \mathbf{e}_2,$$

where λ and μ are real numbers and $\{e_1, e_2\}$ is a basis for K.

7 The square matrix **A** has λ as an eigenvalue with **e** as a corresponding eigenvector. Show that **e** is an eigenvector of \mathbf{A}^2 and state the corresponding eigenvalue. [3]

Find the eigenvalues of the matrix \mathbf{B} , where

$$\mathbf{B} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 3 & 0 \\ 2 & 0 & 2 \\ 1 & 1 & 2 \end{pmatrix}.$$

Find the eigenvalues of $\mathbf{B}^4 + 2\mathbf{B}^2 + 3\mathbf{I}$, where \mathbf{I} is the 3×3 identity matrix. [3]

8 The plane Π_1 has equation $\mathbf{r} = \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ 3 \\ -1 \end{pmatrix} + s \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 0 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix} + t \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ -1 \\ -2 \end{pmatrix}$. Find a cartesian equation of Π_1 . [3]

The plane Π_2 has equation 2x - y + z = 10. Find the acute angle between Π_1 and Π_2 . [2]

Find an equation of the line of intersection of Π_1 and Π_2 , giving your answer in the form $\mathbf{r} = \mathbf{a} + \lambda \mathbf{b}$. [5]

9 The curve C has parametric equations

$$x = t^2$$
, $y = t - \frac{1}{3}t^3$, for $0 \le t \le 1$.

Find the surface area generated when C is rotated through 2π radians about the x-axis. [6]

Find the coordinates of the centroid of the region bounded by C, the x-axis and the line x = 1. [6]

10 The curve *C* has equation

$$y = \frac{px^2 + 4x + 1}{x + 1},$$

where p is a positive constant and $p \neq 3$.

- (i) Obtain the equations of the asymptotes of C. [3]
- (ii) Find the value of p for which the x-axis is a tangent to C, and sketch C in this case. [4]
- (iii) For the case p = 1, show that C has no turning points, and sketch C, giving the exact coordinates of the points of intersection of C with the x-axis. [5]
- 11 Answer only **one** of the following two alternatives.

EITHER

State the fifth roots of unity in the form $\cos \theta + i \sin \theta$, where $-\pi < \theta \le \pi$. [2]

Simplify

$$\left(x - \left[\cos\frac{2}{5}\pi + i\sin\frac{2}{5}\pi\right]\right)\left(x - \left[\cos\frac{2}{5}\pi - i\sin\frac{2}{5}\pi\right]\right).$$
 [2]

Hence find the real factors of

$$x^5 - 1$$
. [2]

Express the six roots of the equation

$$x^6 - x^3 + 1 = 0$$

as three conjugate pairs, in the form $\cos \theta \pm i \sin \theta$.

 $\pm i \sin \theta$. [6]

Hence find the real factors of

$$x^6 - x^3 + 1$$
. [2]

OR

Given that

$$y^2 \frac{d^2 y}{dx^2} - 6y^2 \frac{dy}{dx} + 2y \left(\frac{dy}{dx}\right)^2 + 3y^3 = 25e^{-2x}$$

and that $v = y^3$, show that

$$\frac{d^2v}{dx^2} - 6\frac{dv}{dx} + 9v = 75e^{-2x}.$$

Find the particular solution for y in terms of x, given that when x = 0, y = 2 and $\frac{dy}{dx} = 1$. [10]

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
