- 1 Veale and Riley carried out a self report questionnaire to investigate mirror gazing. An alternative way to investigate mirror gazing in body dysmorphic disorder (BDD) patients is to do an observation.
 - (a) Describe the observational method. [5]
 - (b) Design an alternative way to investigate mirror gazing in BDD patients using the observational method and describe how it could be conducted. [10]
 - (c) Evaluate this alternative way of studying mirror gazing in BDD patients in methodological and practical terms. [10]
- 2 Bandura et al. investigated aggressive behaviour in children.
 - (a) What is meant by the 'nature-nurture debate' in psychology? [2]
 - **(b)** Describe one finding from the study that supports the nurture side of the debate. [3]
 - (c) Discuss the strengths and weaknesses of investigating the nature-nurture debate using the Bandura et al. study as an example. [10]
 - (d) Discuss the extent to which the Bandura et al. study can be applied to everyday life. [10]
