

Section A

Answer Question 1.

1 Techniques for collecting quantitative data include structured interviews, questionnaires, experiments and *content analysis*. A structured interview consists of a spoken question and answer session between interviewer and respondent. In this type of interview each respondent is asked the same questions in the same order. Questionnaires are a set of written questions that are designed to be completed by the respondent in their own time, away from the researcher.

Positivists consider questionnaires to be high in reliability, though interpretivists argue that the data produced may lack validity. This is one reason interpretivists are in favour of using unstructured interviews and are against the use of questionnaires and structured interviews.
