Mathematical Formulae

1. ALGEBRA

Quadratic Equation

For the equation $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$,

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{(b^2 - 4ac)}}{2a}.$$

Binomial Theorem

$$(a+b)^n = a^n + \binom{n}{1} a^{n-1}b + \binom{n}{2} a^{n-2}b^2 + \dots + \binom{n}{r} a^{n-r}b^r + \dots + b^n,$$

where *n* is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r} = \frac{n!}{(n-r)! \ r!}$.

2. TRIGONOMETRY

Identities

$$\sin^2 A + \cos^2 A = 1.$$

$$\sec^2 A = 1 + \tan^2 A.$$

$$\csc^2 A = 1 + \cot^2 A.$$

Formulae for ΔABC

$$\frac{a}{\sin A} = \frac{b}{\sin B} = \frac{c}{\sin C}.$$

$$a^2 = b^2 + c^2 - 2bc \cos A.$$

$$\Delta = \frac{1}{2}bc \sin A.$$

- 1 Find the values of k for which the line y = kx 2 meets the curve $y^2 = 4x x^2$. [4]
- 2 The area of a rectangle is $(1 + \sqrt{6})m^2$. The length of one side is $(\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2})m$. Find, without using a calculator, the length of the other side in the form $\sqrt{a} \sqrt{b}$, where a and b are integers.
- 3 (i) Find the first 3 terms in the expansion, in ascending powers of x, of $(2-x)^5$. [3]
 - (ii) Hence find the value of the constant k for which the coefficient of x in the expansion of $(k+x)(2-x)^5$ is -8.
- An ocean liner is travelling at 36 km h⁻¹ on a bearing of 090°. At 0600 hours the liner, which is 90 km from a lifeboat and on a bearing of 315° from the lifeboat, sends a message for assistance. The lifeboat sets off immediately and travels in a straight line at constant speed, intercepting the liner at 0730 hours. Find the speed at which the lifeboat travels.
- 5 Find the distance between the points of intersection of the curve $y = 3 + \frac{4}{x}$ and the line y = 4x + 9.
- 6 Given that $\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} 2 & -3 \\ 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$, find **B** such that $4\mathbf{A}^{-1} + \mathbf{B} = \mathbf{A}^2$. [6]
- 7 The function f is defined, for $0^{\circ} \le x \le 360^{\circ}$, by $f(x) = 4 \cos 2x$.
 - (i) State the amplitude and period of f.
 - (ii) Sketch the graph of f, stating the coordinates of the maximum points. [4]
 - (ii) Sketch the graph of 1, stating the coordinates of the maximum points.
- **8** The universal set \mathscr{E} and the sets O, P and S are given by


 $\mathscr{E} = \{x : x \text{ is an integer such that } 3 \le x \le 100\},\$





The diagram shows part of the curve $y = \sqrt{1+4x}$, intersecting the y-axis at A. The tangent to the curve at the point P(2, 3) intersects the y-axis at B. Find the area of the shaded region ABP. [11]

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
