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1 The amount of oxygen in a sample of air can be estimated by using the oxygen to produce iodine.

$$O_2 + 4I^- + 4H^+ \rightarrow 2H_2O + 2I_2$$

The amount of iodine produced by the above reaction can then be determined by titration with sodium thiosulfate, $Na_2S_2O_3$, using starch as an indicator.

$$2Na_2S_2O_3 + I_2 \rightarrow Na_2S_4O_6 + 2NaI$$

P is an aqueous solution of iodine produced by the reaction of all the oxygen in a sample of air. **Q** is 0.100 mol/dm³ sodium thiosulfate.

(a) Put Q into the burette.

Pipette a 25.0 cm³ (or 20.0 cm³) portion of **P** into a flask.

Add **Q** from the burette until the red-brown colour fades to pale yellow, **then** add a few drops of the starch indicator. This will give a dark blue solution. Continue adding **Q** slowly from the burette until one drop of **Q** causes the blue colour to disappear, leaving a colourless solution. Record your results in the table, repeating the titration as many times as you consider necessary to achieve consistent results.

(b)	Q is	0.100 mol	/dm³ s	odium	thiosulfate.

$$2\mathrm{Na}_2\mathrm{S}_2\mathrm{O}_3 \ + \ \mathrm{I}_2 \ \longrightarrow \ \mathrm{Na}_2\mathrm{S}_4\mathrm{O}_6 \ + \ 2\mathrm{NaI}$$

(c) Using your answer from (b), deduce the number of moles of oxygen required to produce the iodine in 1.00 dm³ of **P**.

$$O_2 + 4I^- + 4H^+ \rightarrow 2H_2O + 2I_2$$

(d) Given that the number of moles of oxygen in your answer from (c) were present in 3.00 dm³ of air measured at room temperature and pressure, calculate the percentage by volume of oxygen in this sample of air.

(One mole of gas occupies a volume of 24 dm³ at room temperature and pressure.)

Carry out the following tests and record your observations in the table. You should test and name any gas evolved.

1	 (a) To 1 cm depth of dilute sulfuric acid in a test-tube, add a few drops of methyl orange indicator. (b) To the mixture from (a), add R until no further change occurs. 	
2	To 1 cm depth of aqueous zinc sulfate in a test-tube, add R until no further change occurs.	
To 2 cm depth of R in a test-tube, add a piece of aluminium foil and warm the mixture gently until the reaction begins.		
4	(a) To 1 cm depth of S in a test-tube, add an equal volume of aqueous silver nitrate.(b) To the mixture from (a), add dilute nitric acid.

5	To 1 cm depth of S in a test-tube, add aqueous ammonia until no further change occurs.	
	Retain this mixture for use in Test 6.

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QUALITATIVE ANALYSIS NOTES

Tests for anions

anion	test	test result
carbonate (CO ₃ ²⁻)	add dilute acid	effervescence, carbon dioxide produced
chloride (C <i>l</i> ⁻) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous silver nitrate	white ppt.
iodide (I ⁻) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous silver nitrate	yellow ppt.
nitrate (NO ₃ ⁻) [in solution]	add aqueous sodium hydroxide then add aluminium foil; warm carefully	ammonia produced
sulfate (SO ₄ ²⁻) [in solution]	acidify with dilute nitric acid, then add aqueous barium nitrate	white ppt.

Tests for aqueous cations

cation	effect of aqueous sodium hydroxide	effect of aqueous ammonia
aluminium (Al ³⁺)	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution	white ppt., insoluble in excess
ammonium (NH ₄ ⁺)	ammonia produced on warming	_
calcium (Ca ²⁺)	white ppt., insoluble in excess	no ppt., or very slight white ppt.
copper(II) (Cu ²⁺)	light blue ppt., insoluble in excess	light blue ppt., soluble in excess giving a dark blue solution
iron(II) (Fe ²⁺)	green ppt., insoluble in excess	green ppt., insoluble in excess
iron(III) (Fe ³⁺)	red-brown ppt., insoluble in excess	red-brown ppt., insoluble in excess
zinc (Zn ²⁺)	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution	white ppt., soluble in excess giving a colourless solution

Tests for gases

gas	test and test result
ammonia (NH ₃)	turns damp red litmus paper blue
carbon dioxide (CO ₂)	turns limewater milky
chlorine (Cl ₂)	bleaches damp litmus paper
hydrogen (H ₂)	'pops' with a lighted splint
oxygen (O ₂)	relights a glowing splint

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
